AMENDED AND RESTATED CHARTER OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF AMYRIS, INC.

As adopted on March 10, 2010 Amended and Restated on November 2, 2017, October 23, 2019, May 28, 2020, November 17, 2020, and March 9, 2022

I. PURPOSE

The purposes of the Audit Committee (the "Committee") is to provide assistance to the Board of Directors (the "Board") of Amyris, Inc. (the "Company") in fulfilling the Board's oversight of (i) the Company's accounting and system of internal controls, (ii) the quality and integrity of the Company's financial reports, (iii) the independence and performance of the Company's risk assessment registered public accounting firm ("Independent Auditors"), (iv) the Company's risk assessment and management, and (v) certain sensitive or strategic transactions.

In order to fulfill its purpose, the Audit Committee is to:

- Oversee the Company's accounting and financial reporting processes and audits of Company's consolidated financial statements, and disclosure thereof;
- monitor the periodic reviews of the adequacy of the accounting and financial reporting processes and systems of internal control that are conducted by the Independent Auditors and the Company's senior management.;
- oversee the Company's relationship with the Independent Auditors, including selecting, appointing or dismissing the Company's Independent Auditors, ensuring the independence of Independent Auditors, and facilitating communication among the Independent Auditors, the Company's senior management and the Board;
- monitor the Company's risk assessment and management, and compliance with legal and regulatory requirements; and
- oversee certain sensitive or strategic transactions.

This charter (this "Charter") sets forth the authority and responsibility of the Committee in fulfilling its purpose. While the Committee has the responsibilities and powers set forth in this Charter, it is not the duty of the Committee to plan or conduct audits or to determine that the Company's financial statements are complete and accurate and are in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. This is the responsibility of the Company's senior management and the Independent Auditors.

II. MEMBERSHIP

• The Committee will consist of three or more members of the Board, with the exact number being determined by the Board. Each member of the Committee shall be an "independent director" as defined under the applicable rules, regulations and listing requirements of the

- principal stock exchange where the Company's common stock is listed for trading, as amended from time to time (the "Exchange Rules");
- At least one member of the Committee must have past employment experience in finance, accounting or financial oversight, as required by the Exchange Rules;
- Each member of the Committee must be able to read and understand fundamental financial statements, including the Company's balance sheet, income statement and cash flow statement; and
- The Committee members shall be free from any relationship that, in the opinion of the Board, would interfere with the exercise of independent judgment as a Committee member.

All members of the Committee will be appointed by, and will serve at the discretion of, the Board. Members of the Committee may be replaced or removed by the Board at any time, with or without cause, which will automatically constitute resignation or removal, as applicable, from the Committee. The Board may appoint a member of the Committee to serve as the chairperson of the Committee (the "*Chair*"). If the Board does not appoint a Chair, the Committee members may designate a Chair by their majority vote. The Chair will set the agenda for Committee meetings and conduct the proceedings of those meetings.

III. RESPONSIBILITIES AND DUTIES

The principal responsibilities and duties of the Committee in serving the purposes outlined in Section I of this Charter are set forth below. These duties are set forth as a guide with the understanding that the Committee will carry them out in a manner that is appropriate given the Company's needs and circumstances. The Committee may supplement them as appropriate and may establish policies and procedures from time to time that it deems necessary or advisable in fulfilling its responsibilities.

The Committee will:

Financial Statements and Disclosures

- 1. Review and discuss with senior management and the Independent Auditors the Company's quarterly and annual results. Review and discuss with senior management both the quarterly and annual earnings press releases and related scripts prior to distribution to, or communication with, the public; *provided* that this review responsibility may be delegated to the Committee Chair or a member of the Committee who is a financial expert.
- 2. Review the Company's quarterly and annual financial statements, including any report on the Company's internal control over financial reporting, any report or opinion by the Independent Auditors, and the disclosures in "Management's Discussion and Analysis of Financial Condition and Results of Operations" included in the Company's quarterly and annual reports on Forms 10-Q and 10-K.
 - 3. In connection with the Committee's review of the annual financial statements:
 - discuss the financial statements and the results of the Independent Auditors' audit of the financial statements with the Independent Auditors and certain members of the Company's senior management;

- discuss any items required to be communicated by the Independent Auditors in accordance with the applicable requirements of the Public Company Accounting Oversight Board; and
- discuss with certain members of the Company's senior management and the Independent Auditors the Company's selection, application and disclosure of critical accounting policies and practices.
- 4. Recommend to the Board whether the annual audited financial statements should be included in the Company's Annual Report on Form 10-K for the relevant fiscal year.
 - 5. In connection with the Committee's review of the quarterly financial statements:
 - discuss with the Independent Auditors and the Company's senior management the results of the Independent Auditors' review of the quarterly financial statements and resolve any issue that may arise;
 - discuss significant issues, events and transactions and any significant changes regarding accounting principles, practices, policies (internal or external), judgments or estimates with certain members of the Company's senior management and the Independent Auditors; and
 - discuss and assist in resolving any disagreements between the Company's senior management and the Independent Auditors regarding financial reporting.
- 6. Annually prepare a report to the Company's stockholders for inclusion in the Company's annual proxy statement as required by the rules of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "Commission Rules").

Internal Controls

- 7. Periodically discuss with the Company's principal accounting officer the function of the Company's disclosure controls and procedures and the processes and reports of the Company's disclosure committee, as managed by the Company's principal accounting officer. Discuss with the Company's Chief Executive Officer and Chief Financial Officer their conclusions regarding the effectiveness of the Company's disclosure controls and procedures.
- 8. Review and discuss with the Independent Auditors and certain members of the Company's senior management their periodic reviews of the adequacy of the Company's accounting and financial reporting processes and systems of internal controls, and provide oversight over the implementation, adequacy, and effectiveness of the Company's accounting and financial reporting processes and systems of internal controls and any material changes to such processes or systems, including any significant deficiencies and/or material weaknesses in their design or operation. In doing so, the Committee shall evaluate the Company's compliance with Section 404 of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002, including risk management required thereby.
- 9. Review any allegations of fraud involving senior management or any other employee of the Company with a significant role in the Company's accounting and financial reporting processes or internal controls over financial reporting that are disclosed to the Committee.

- 10. Discuss any comments or recommendations of the Independent Auditors outlined in their annual management letter or reports on internal controls.
- 11. Periodically consult with the Independent Auditors outside of the presence of the Company's senior management about internal controls, the fullness and accuracy of the Company's financial statements, and any other matters that the Committee or Independent Auditors believe should be discussed privately with the Committee.
- 12. Meet separately, periodically, with certain members of the Company's senior management and with internal auditors (including the principal accounting officer, controller, or other personnel responsible for the internal audit function).

Independent Auditors

- 13. Be directly responsible for the selection or appointment, compensation, retention, dismissal, and oversight of the work of the Independent Auditors. The Independent Auditors will report directly to the Committee.
- 14. Review and discuss with the Independent Auditors and senior management (a) any significant audit problems or difficulties, including difficulties encountered by the Independent Auditors during their audit work (such as restrictions on the scope of their activities or their access to information), (b) any significant disagreements between senior management and the Independent Auditors, and (c) senior management's response to these problems, difficulties, or disagreements.
 - 15. Review the continuing independence of the Independent Auditors, including:
 - obtaining and reviewing, on an annual basis, a letter from the Independent Auditors describing all relationships between the Independent Auditors and the Company;
 - reviewing and discussing with the Independent Auditors their independence, including the nature and scope of any such relationships; and
 - taking appropriate action to oversee the independence of the Independent Auditors, including discontinuing any relationships that the Committee believes compromises the independence of the Independent Auditors.
 - 16. Review the Independent Auditors' audit planning, scope, and staffing.
- 17. Approve the fees and other compensation to be paid to the Independent Auditors, and pre-approve all audit and non-audit related services to be provided by the Independent Auditors as permitted by the Exchange Rules, the Commission Rules, and other applicable laws or regulations. The Committee may establish pre-approval policies and procedures for the engagement of the Independent Auditors to render services to the Company, including without limitation, policies that would allow the delegation of pre-approval authority to one or more members of the Committee, provided that any pre-approval decision is reported to the Committee at its next scheduled meeting.
- 18. Review and discuss with the Independent Auditors the reports delivered to the Committee by the Independent Auditors regarding:
 - critical accounting policies, estimates and practices used;

- alternative treatments of financial information within generally accepted accounting principles that have been discussed with certain members of the Company's senior management, the ramifications of the alternative treatments, and the treatment preferred by the Independent Auditors; and
- other material written communications between the Independent Auditors and the Company's senior management, such as any management letter or schedule of unadjusted differences.
- 19. Consider and assess the desirability of developing Company policies for hiring of employees or former employees of the Independent Auditors, as required by the Exchange Rules, the Commission Rules, and other applicable industry standards.

Risk Oversight and Compliance

- 20. Review with certain members of the Company's senior management, on a quarterly and annual basis, the Company's major financial risk and enterprise exposures and the steps senior management has taken to monitor such exposures, including the Company's policies and procedures related to risk assessment and management.
- 21. Review with senior management on a quarterly basis (i) the Company's cyber security and other information technology risks, controls and procedures, including plans to mitigate cyber security risks and respond to data breaches and (ii) the Company's risk exposures in other areas, as the Committee deems necessary or appropriate from time to time.
- 22. Establish procedures for (i) the receipt, retention and treatment of complaints received by the Company regarding accounting, internal accounting or financial controls or auditing matters, and violations of the Company's Code of Business Conduct and Ethics or other compliance policies or applicable law; and (ii) the confidential, anonymous submission by Company employees of concerns regarding questionable accounting or auditing matters, or questionable financial reporting processes or systems of internal control, or violations of Company policies or applicable laws. Oversee the review of any such complaints and submissions that have been received, including the current status and the resolution if one has been reached, in coordination with the Company's General Counsel.
- 23. Review and approve any proposed transaction between the Company and any related party (other than transactions that are subject to review and approval by another independent committee of the Board), as defined by applicable law, the Commission Rules, and the Exchange Rules in accordance with the Company's Related Party Transactions Policy.
- 24. Periodically review the Company's Investment Policy and the Company's compliance with it.
- 25. Periodically review the Company's Related Party Transactions Policy and recommend to the Board any changes the Committee determines are appropriate.
- 26. On a regular basis, review the status of any legal and regulatory matters (including any material litigation, pre-litigation correspondence, or reports or inquiries received from regulators or government agencies) that could have a significant impact on the Company's financial statements.

Financings and Strategic Transactions

- 27. Review and oversee senior management's plans and objectives for the capitalization of the Company, including debt and equity structures, as necessary to meet the Company's operational and financing needs.
- 28. Review and recommend that the Board approve senior management's recommendations with respect to new offerings of debt, equity or hybrid securities, stock splits, and credit agreements, or material changes or amendments to the Company's current debt and equity instruments and agreements, as well as minority investments (whether in debt or in equity) by the Company.
- 29. Review and recommend that the Board approve senior management's recommendations with respect to significant lease agreements, mergers, acquisitions or divestitures and strategic transactions (operational or commercial) that may involve sensitive competition issues.

General

30. Perform any other activities required by applicable law, rules, or regulations, including the Commission Rules and the Exchange Rules, and take such other actions and perform and carry out any other responsibilities and duties delegated to it by the Board or as the Committee deems necessary or appropriate consistent with its purpose.

IV. STUDIES AND ADVISERS

The Committee, in discharging its responsibilities, may conduct, direct, supervise or authorize studies of, or investigations into, any matter that the Committee deems appropriate, with full and unrestricted access to all books, records, documents, facilities and personnel of the Company. The Committee has the sole authority and right, at the expense of the Company, to retain legal and other consultants, accountants, experts and other advisers of its choice to assist the Committee in connection with its functions, including any studies or investigations, and shall have direct oversight of the work performed by such advisors. The Committee will have the sole authority to approve the fees and other retention terms of such advisers, and terminate their services. The Company will provide for appropriate funding, as determined by the Committee, for:

- payment of compensation to any legal and other consultants, accountants, experts, and advisers retained by the Committee; and
- ordinary administrative expenses of the Committee that are necessary and appropriate in carrying out its functions.

Irrespective of the retention of consultants, accountants, legal counsel, experts, and other advisers to assist the Committee, the Committee will exercise its own judgment in the fulfillment of its functions.

V. MEETINGS AND ACTIONS WITHOUT A MEETING

Meetings of the Committee shall be held at least 4 times each year or more frequently, as determined appropriate by the Committee. The Chair, in consultation with the other members of the Committee, will set the dates, times and places of such meetings. The Chair or any other member

of the Committee may call meetings of the Committee by notice in accordance with the Company's Bylaws. A quorum of the Committee for the transaction of business will be a majority of its members. The Committee also may act by unanimous written consent in lieu of a meeting in accordance with the Company's Bylaws.

VI. MINUTES AND REPORTS

The Committee will maintain written minutes of its meetings and copies of its actions by written consent, and will cause such minutes and copies of written consents to be filed with the minutes of the meetings of the Board. The Chair will report to the Board from time to time with respect to the activities of the Committee.

VII. COMPENSATION

Members of the Committee will receive such fees, if any, for their service as Committee members as may be determined by the Board, which may include additional compensation for the Chair.

VIII. REVIEW OF COMMITTEE COMPOSITION, PERFORMANCE AND CHARTER

The Committee may, from time to time as it deems appropriate, evaluate the Committee's composition and performance and make a report to the Board regarding such evaluation. The Committee also will review and reassess the adequacy of this Charter from time to time, and recommend to the Board any changes the Committee determines are appropriate.

IX. PUBLICATION

The Company shall make this Charter freely available to stockholders on request and, provided that the Company is subject to the periodic reporting requirements of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, shall publish it on the Company's website.
